WE NEED HIM


Adam, tempted in the garden, fell by eating the fruit; but Jesus, when enticed by the lure of food, triumphed. In him we have removal of original sin and afresh beginning. Jesus is the New Adam. The fact that Jesus was tempted proves that he is human. That he didn't' succumb is a sign of his divinity. In today's gospel, it seems that the devil wanted to know Jesus' identity and tried to trick him into working a miracle that would prove he was God, for only God could turn rocks into bread. Tis whole temptation scene shows the strength of Jesus, who could control his great hunger after 40 days of fasting in the desert. If we were famished, we would probably do almost everything to get food and would feel justified in doing so. When it concerns food, many of us would fall easily. The devil knows how to handle a hungry person, but he never learned how to handle a hungry God.

Jesus was tempted by the devil to other foolish deeds, such as bowing down to worship him – which he didn't do, of course, but which we might do if the payoff is big enough. Then there was an invitation to leap off a tall building – the corner of the temple building. It would have been a show off stunt to impress the people. Here again, Jesus didn't jump off for glory. Just as he didn't jump off the cross, in spite of his agonising pain. Instead, we do the jumping, to gain approval or applause and to avoid little inconveniences or difficulties. We manifest a severe spiritual weakness when we jump to false conclusions about others and misjudge their motives.

Jesus must have endured numerous temptations during his life, especially in those unsheltered public years. We believe he emerged completely victorious in all those temptations. As for the rest of us who fail our many temptations, we realise that the power of Christ has not yet really taken hold of our lives. As we listen to the story of the Jesus' temptations in today's gospel reading, let us acknowledge some basic truths: *WE ARE WEAK. JESUS IS STRONG. WE NEED HIM*!

PARISH UPDATE

School: Last Monday, Feb 8, was our first Finance Council meeting and we invited our acting school principal, Bronwyn Buckley, to give us a snapshot of the financial status of our school. Thanks to the very good administration of our former principal, John Spillane, our school is in pretty good shape financially. School library will undergo a major face-lift. The work will kick off during Easter break.

School Board Council: Our school has also its own Board Council to help the principal in executing policies and activities related to parents and students benefits. Our parishioner, Shane McCaffery, is our official parish representative to the School Board Council.

Ash Wednesday: That was the biggest Ash Wednesday mass crowd in my 12 years in Australia. And I thank all those directly involved in the celebration in different ministries.

Pastoral Council: The 3-year term of office of the existing PPC members has ended this month (February). From the bottom of my heart I express my vote of thanks to Denise Love, Ann Hannaby, Rita Blacker, Niko Silao, Shane McCaffery and Muriel Mairhofer for helping me in running the parish, especially in my first year of ministering St. Edward's Parish. Thank you for all your whole-hearted support. A new team of PPC was born with 9 members. I have

re-appointed Denise Love to lead the team. But Denise's responsibility with the PPC is good only for this year 2016. She will relinquish her role by next year as she will focus her ministry in the Sacramental Programme. The young and vibrant Steve Richardson is the PPC Deputy. They will be officially commissioned this weekend, during the Sunday 8:30am mass.

Finance Council: The same with the PPC, the 3-year term of office of PFC has ended this month. And I am very grateful to David McLean, Eve Douglas, Shirley D'Mello, Maureen Thornton and John Winter for their full support and good advices especially when we had the construction of our Presbytery House. Special thanks to John Winter for being so instrumental in helping me to supervise the Presbytery house construction. A new PFC team was born, composed of 5 members. And I have appointed Cheryl McCaffery as chairperson with Ravi Raveendrakumar as Deputy. Cheryl and Ravi have been so faithful in our parish for almost 30 vears now.

Sacramental Programme: I created a dedicated staff (5 of them) for our Parish Sacramental Programme (PSP). I appointed Denise Love to lead the staff with Corrie Wall as her Deputy. On Monday, Feb 15, is our first staff meeting when we draw a map for this year's Sacrament of Confirmation which will take place on April 28.

Seminar for New Parish Volunteers: Michelle Vuleta of the Archdiocese of Brisbane will come to our parish on March 3, Thursday, at 6:30pm to give a 2-hour seminar to our new parish volunteers (readers, communion ministers and hospitality team) on Safeguarding Children and Vulnerable. The seminar will be held in our Church.

Guest Priest: Fr. Morgan Batt is the Vocation Director of the Archdiocese of Brisbane. His project this year is to visit all parishes on weekends (from Hervey Bay to Coolangatta) to spread about the need for Vocations to the Priesthood. On Feb 20-21 (Saturday-Sunday) is his scheduled visit to our parish and he will be the main celebrant for the weekend masses.



Basic questions answered according to the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

Let's get to know our faith. Question: What happened on Pentecost? // What does the Holy Spirit do in the Church?

What happened on Pentecost?

Fifty days after his Resurrection, the Lord sent the Holy Spirit down from heaven upon his disciples. The age of the Church began.

On Pentecost the Holy Spirit transformed fearful apostles into courageous witnesses to Christ. In a very short time, thousands had themselves baptized: it was the birthday of the Church. The miracle of the languages on Pentecost shows that the Church is there for all peoples from the very beginning: She is universal (= the Latin term for the Greek kat' holon, catholic) and missionary. She speaks to all men, overcomes ethnic and linguistic barriers, and can be understood by all. To this day the Holy Spirit is the "soul" of the Church, the essential principle of her life.

What does the Holy Spirit do in the Church?

The Holy Spirit builds up the Church and impels her. He reminds her of her mission. He calls people into her service and sends them the necessary gifts. He leads us ever deeper into communion with the Triune God.

Even though the Church during her long history has often seemed

"abandoned by all good spirits", the Holy Spirit has been at work in her despite all the human failings and inadequacies. The mere fact of her two-thousand-year existence and the many saints of all eras and cultures are the visible proof of his presence. The Holy Spirit is the one who maintains the Church as a whole in the truth and leads her ever deeper into the knowledge of God. It is the Holy Spirit who works in the sacraments and brings Sacred Scripture to life for us. Even today he gives his gifts of grace (charisms) to those who are completely receptive to him. (YOUCAT questions 118-119)

Question: What does the Holy Spirit do in my life?

What does the Holy Spirit do in my life?

The Holy Spirit makes me receptive to God; he teaches me to pray and helps me to be there for others.

Augustine calls the Holy Spirit "The quiet guest of our soul". Anyone who wants to sense his presence must be quiet. Often this Guest speaks very softly within us and with us, for instance, in the voice of our conscience or through other interior and exterior promptings. Being a "temple of the Holy Spirit" means being there, body and soul, for this Guest, for God in us. Our body is therefore God's living room, so to speak. The more receptive we are to the Holy Spirit in us, the more he becomes the master of our life, the sooner he will bestow on us even today his charisms for the up building of the Church. And so, instead of the works of the flesh, the fruits of the Spirit grow in us. (YOUCAT question 120) Material as published in: Catechism in a year/ https://uno.flocknote.com/list

Griffith University – Orientation Week (22-26 February)


