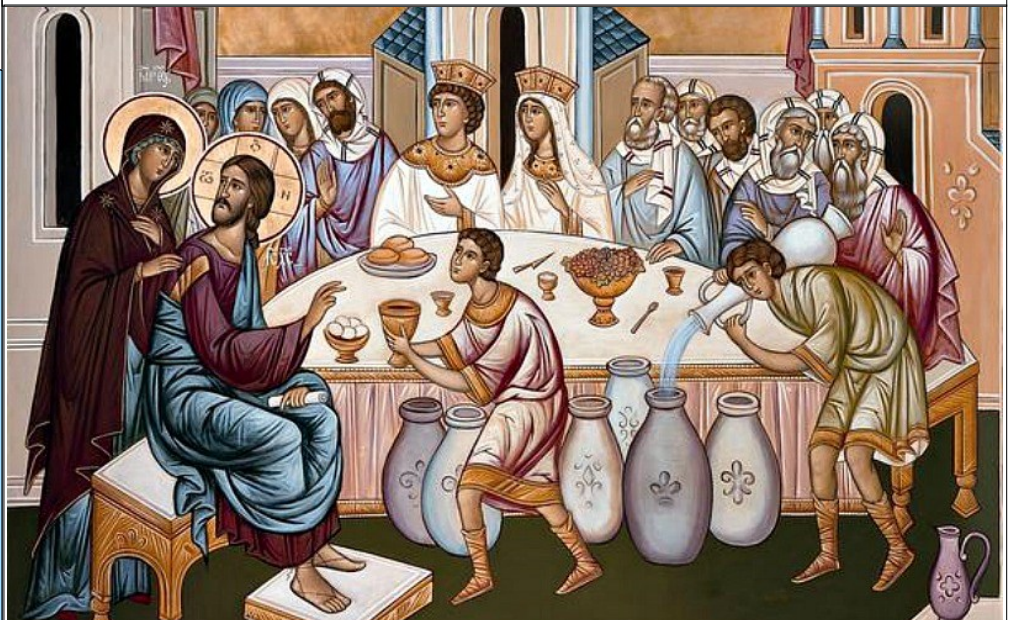

THE CHURCH AT CANA

Today's gospel about the marriage feast at Cana is one of the most humanly appealing stories about Jesus. To see his interest and concern for the young married couple is something I believe we all appreciate. There is also a warm humanness about the fact that Mary, his mother, apparently refused to say "NO" for an answer from Jesus. And yet there seems to be something deeper in the gospel, something very significant underlying the charming gospel report.

We have a hint that there is something more in the gospel than just a story. The water turned into wine. The source of the gospel today, St. John, doesn't focus on the miracle itself. He points out that the whole gathering (wedding) was a sign of the Church. It is bit of a complex to understand, but it worth going into. It is noteworthy that the event took place at a wedding feast. The Old Testament pictured the people of Israel as the spouse of God. As the first reading says from Isaiah: As a bridegroom rejoices in his bride, so shall God rejoice in you." St. Paul in accord with this same symbol, spoke of the Church as the new Israel, the bride of Christ. And so it appears that St. John used the wedding feast to show that he wished to say something about the Church.

By his death and resurrection, Jesus was to form the new people of God, the Church. As Jesus changed the water into a fuller and richer liquid, that of wine, so he was going to change the old Jewish religion into a fuller and richer religion of Christianity. The choice of wine kept until later in the history of the human race is Christianity, and we are the ones who enjoy the richness of that wine.

Yes, we are the ones who benefit by the church. But the Church is not something we simply enjoy. It is not merely a source of goodness for us, as we sit back and drink its pleasant wine. Notice in the gospel story today, that, although Jesus worked the miracle by his own power alone, he did so in cooperation with others: with Mary his mother; with the headwaiter, and his assistants. And so in the Church, each one of us has his or her job to do in cooperation with Christ.

The society's spiritual focus for this year is The Year of Mercy which was inaugurated by Pope Francis on 8th December 2015. He said he wanted to usher in a "revolution of tenderness" and has exhorted all Catholics to rediscover the Corporal and Spiritual works of mercy and choose one to reflect on and practise each month of this special year. Let us explore the word Mercy. It is not pity, sympathy or commiseration as the dictionary states. It is much more, it is compassion/suffering with others and having a strong desire to alleviate their suffering. This meaning fits in beautifully with the Corporal and Spiritual works of Mercy as expressed in The Catholic Catechism 1994.

CATECHISM of the CATHOLIC CHURCH

Basic questions answered
according to the Catechism of the Cath-
olic Church.

Let's get to know our faith.

Question: Why did Jesus redeem us on the Cross?

Why did Jesus have to redeem us on the Cross, of all places?

The Cross on which Jesus, although innocent, was cruelly executed is the place of utmost degradation and abandonment. Christ, our Redeemer, chose the Cross so as to bear the guilt of the world and to suffer the pain of the world. So he brought the world back home to God by his perfect love. God could not show his love more forcibly than by allowing himself in the person of the Son to be nailed to the Cross for us. Crucifixion was the most shameful and most horrible method of execution in antiquity. It was forbidden to crucify Roman citizens, whatever crimes they were guilty of. Thereby God entered into the most abysmal sufferings of mankind. Since then, no one can say "God does not know what I'm suffering." (YOUCAT question 101)

Question: Why do we take up our cross? // Was Jesus really dead?

Why are we, too, supposed to accept suffering in our lives and thus take up our cross and thereby follow Jesus?

Christians should not seek suffering, but when they are confronted with unavoidable suffering, it can become meaningful for them if they unite their sufferings with the sufferings of Christ: "Christ ... suffered for you, leaving you an example, that you should follow in his steps" (1 Pet 2:21). Jesus said, "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me" (Mk 8:34). Christians have the task of alleviating suffering in the world. Nevertheless, there will still be suffering. In faith we can accept our own suffering and share the suffering of others. In this way human suffering becomes united with the redeeming love of Christ and thus part of the divine power that changes the world for the better.

Was Jesus really dead? Maybe he was able to rise again because he only appeared to have suffered death.

Jesus really died on the Cross; his body was buried. All the sources testify to this.

In John 19:33ff., the soldiers even make an explicit determination of death: They open the side of Jesus' dead body with a lance and see blood and water come out. Furthermore, it says that the legs of the men crucified with him were broken - a step that hastened the dying process; this was not required in Jesus' case since his death had already occurred. (YOUCAT questions 102-103)

Question: Can you be a Christian and not believe in the Resurrection? // How did the disciples come to believe Jesus was risen?

Can you be a Christian without believing in the Resurrection of Christ?

No. "If Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain" (1 Cor 15:14).

How did the disciples come to believe that Jesus is risen?

The disciples, who before had lost all hope, came to believe in Jesus' Resurrection because they saw him in a different way after his death, spoke with him, and experienced him as being alive.

The Easter events that took place in Jerusalem in the year 30 are not a made-up story. Following the death of Jesus and the defeat of their whole cause, the disciples fled ("We had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel", Lk 24:21) or else barricaded themselves behind locked doors. Only their encounter with the risen Christ freed them from their paralysis and filled them with an enthusiastic faith in Jesus Christ, the Lord of life and death. (YOUCAT questions 104-105)
