A GIFT TO US

The word
"epiphany" is a
Greek word
which means
"manifestation."
On this day,
Jesus manifested
that He was to
be the Saviour
not only for the
Jews but to all
humanity. This
idea is presented

in today's second reading (Ephesians 2:2-3,5-6) God's secret plan...has been revealed by the Spirit...In Christ Jesus the Gentiles are now coheirs with the Jews, members of the same body and sharers of the promise through the preaching of the gospel." The feast of the Epiphany also manifests *how* Jesus was to be the Saviour of the world. The Church, according to a very ancient tradition, sees the gifts (gold, frankincense and myrrh) of the Magi as symbolic of his mission and his character. Gold was the most precious metal of the day. It was intended to manifest the value and preciousness of the person of Christ; that value is infinite because Jesus is God himself. Frankincense or simply incense, was used in worship, and it was a sign that Jesus would be a priest who would a perfect worship to his Father in heaven. Myrrh was used to embalm bodies in preparation for burial. It symbolised how Jesus would give worship to his Father, that is, by sacrifice, by the offering of his life as a victim.

And so, the Epiphany brings out not so much that Jesus was a receiver of gifts from the Magi, but that he himself was to be a most precious gift to his Father in the worship of sacrifice. He was to save all people by the offering of himself as a victim. Jesus is a gift to us from the Father.

In the Holy Mass, at the time of the consecration of the bread and wine, we hear these words: Take this all of you and eat it, this is my body which will be give up for you." And for the wine: "Take this all of you and drink from it, this is the Chalice of my Blood..." The body and blood would mean that Jesus has given his whole life for us all. Every Mass, then, Jesus manifests as the Saviour of us all. The Holy Mass continues the sacrificial offering of Jesus. Jesus is our gift. We must remember how precious Jesus is: more precious than gold or anything else we can imagine. We are indeed fortunate in having the perfect gift to offer to God.

The Little King's Movement for the Handicapped

Was founded in 1968 under the umbrella of the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary. It provides an opportunity for persons with disability to access a social life, gatherings, and activities to help overcome loneliness and for them to enjoy the advantages of today's world in company, education and acceptance into a friendly atmosphere, all based on Christian values.

A special emphasis is placed on helping parents as well as the disabled with their personal, spiritual and social lives.

Although based on Catholic beliefs, it is ecumenical and all members and people with disabilities are welcome.

The members of the Little King's Movement commit themselves to brining to people with disabilities a sense of worth, a sense of being valued and sense of being loved.

There are no Government Subsidies, and most activities are voluntary. ALL ACTIVITIES FOR OUR DISABLED FRIENDS ARE FREE OF CHARGE.

This is a major fundraiser for the year, to be held on 23rd and 24t h January in our Parish. In previous years this parish has been very generous even in the most difficult financial times, for which the Movement is most grateful.



ATECHISM Basic questions answered according to the Catechism of the of the according to the CATHOLIC Catholic Church.

Let's get to know our faith.

Question: Why did Jesus need to be Baptized?

Why did Jesus allow John to baptize him, although he was without sin?

To baptize means to immerse. In his baptism, Jesus descended into the sinful history of all mankind. By doing so he established a sign. In order to redeem us from our sins, he would one day be submerged in death but, through his Father's power, reawakened to life.

Sinners soldiers, prostitutes, tax collectors went out to the prophet John the Baptist because they were looking for the "baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins" (Lk 3:3). Strictly speaking, Jesus did not need this baptism, because he was sinless. The fact that he submitted to this baptism shows us two things: Jesus takes *our* sins upon himself. Jesus understands his baptism as an anticipation of his Passion and Resurrection. At this sign of his willingness to die for us, the heavens open: "You are my beloved Son" (Lk 3:22b). (YOUCAT question 86)

Question:How could Jesus be tempted? // To whom did Jesus promise the kingdom of God?

Why was Jesus led into temptation? Could he really be tempted at all?

Jesus was truly human, and as part of that he was truly susceptible to temptation. In Jesus Christ we do not have the sort of redeemer "who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sinning" (Heb 4:15).

To whom does Jesus promise the kingdom of God?

God wills "all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth" (1 Tim 2:4). The "kingdom of God" begins in those who allow themselves to be transformed by God's love. In Jesus' experience these are above all the poor and the lowly.

Even people unaffiliated with the Church find it fascinating that Jesus, with a sort of preferential love, turns first to those who are socially marginalized. In the Sermon on the Mount, it is the poor and the sorrowing, the victims of persecution and violence, all those who seek God with a pure heart, all who seek his mercy, his justice, and his peace, who have prior access to the kingdom of God. Especially invited are sinners also: "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick; I came not to call the righteous, but sinners" (Mk 2:17). (YOUCAT questions 88-89)

Ouestion:Did Jesus really work miracles? Did Jesus work miracles, or are they just pious tales?

Jesus really worked miracles, and so did the apostles. The New Testament authors refer to real incidents.

Even the oldest sources tell of numerous miracles, even the raising of the dead, as a confirmation of Jesus' preaching: "But if it is by the Spirit of God that I cast out demons, then the kingdom of God has come upon you" (Mt 12:28). The miracles took place in public; some of the persons involved were known by name, for instance, blind Bartimaeus (Mk 10:46-52) or Peter's mother-in-law (Mt 8:14-15). There were also miracles that in those Jewish circles were considered shocking and outrageous (for example, the cure of a crippled man on the Sabbath, the cure of lepers). Nevertheless they were not disputed by contemporary Judaism. (YOUCAT question 90)

Question: WHY did Jesus works miracles? But why did Jesus work miracles?

The miracles that Jesus worked were signs that the kingdom of God was beginning. They expressed his love for mankind and reaffirmed his mission.

Jesus' miracles were not self-aggrandizing displays of magic. He was filled with the power of God's healing love. Through his miracles he showed that he is the Messiah and that the kingdom of God begins in him. Thus it became possible to experience the dawn of the new world: he freed people from hunger (Jn 6:5-15), injustice (Lk 19:8), sickness, and death (Mt 11:5). By driving out demons, he began his victorious advance against the "ruler of this world" (meaning Satan; see Jn 12:31). Nevertheless, Jesus did not remove all misfortune and evil from the world. He directed his attention principally to freeing man from the slavery of sin. His central concern was faith, which he also elicited through miracles. (YOUCAT question 91)

Question: Why did Jesus call apostles? Why did Jesus call apostles?

Jesus had a large circle of disciples around him, both men and women. From this circle he selected twelve men whom he called apostles (Lk 6:12-16). The apostles were specially trained by him and entrusted with various commissions: "He sent them out to preach the kingdom of God and to heal" (Lk 9:2). Jesus took only these twelve apostles with him to the Last Supper, where he gave them the command, "Do this in remembrance of me" (Lk 22:19b). The apostles became witnesses of Jesus' Resurrection and guarantors of the truth about him. They continued Jesus' mission after his death. They chose successors for their ministry: the bishops. To this day, the successors of the apostles exercise the authority conferred by Jesus: They govern and teach and celebrate the liturgy. The cohesiveness of the apostles became the foundation for the unity of the Church (apostolic succession). Preeminent once again among the Twelve was Peter, on whom Jesus bestowed special authority: "You are Peter, and on this rock I will build my Church" (Mt 16:18). From Peter's special role among the apostles developed the papal ministry. (YOUCAT question 92)





Office will close from 12.30 pm on 31st December And will open at 9.00 am on the 4th January 2016 for the New Year.


