COME ON HOME!

Among his many talents, Jesus was a superb story-teller. In today's Gospel reading ranks perhaps as the top. It's the parable of the prodigal son. The central figure is an attentive father, who is a very good man perhaps too good, when it comes to catering to the whims of his two ungracious sons with their radically opposing views of life. He is generous, permissive and forgiving to the younger son and self-effacing, patient and consoling to the elder. Although the one is prodigal and the other paranoid, the caring father is understanding and supportive to both.

Many applications can be and have been made of this time-honoured story, but in its current mid-Lenten

context, it invites us to confidently approach our forgiving Heavenly Father, who understands and loves us dearly. We may like the younger brother, dissatisfied with home or family life, carefree and irresponsible. He wasn't a bad boy – just restless and adventurous. He did, however, insult his father grievously by asking for his share of the family inheritance – which customarily was divided up only after the father's death. Perhaps he didn't intend the insult, but asking for his portion of the estate was like telling his dad to drop dead. The father, no doubt shattered by his impulsive brashness, still gave him the money.

Are we not like the insulting prodigal sometimes – insensitively sinful toward God and others, while considering ourselves clever and cool? Often those we offend suffer in silence- like Jesus on the cross. Lent calls us to a deeper appreciation of others by looking beyond our own selfish attitudes. May be we identify more closely with the older brother – being withdrawn, unpopular, bitter and afraid to mix with others. Perhaps, like him, we find security in excessive devotion to duty and saving our money. We may be critical of civil and church leaders and mistrusting of people in general; thinking that those who act friendly are only trying to take advantage of us. Lent in this case invites us to open up, communicate and share with our brothers and sisters, realising that they love us for our own sakes and that the Father loves us even more than others.

Hether prodigal or paranoid or whatever, we need not feel rejected. Although our sins have told Jesus to drop dead – which he did on the cross, but not for long –He still invites us to return home any time when we are ready. There is more to life than we find in the pig pen. The Father offers us a robe, a ring, and a roast beef dinner, with family and friends around His table. *Come on home!*

PARISH UPDATE

The general meeting last Monday with parents of candidates for the Sacramental programme went so well. We have a total of 78 candidates for this year, the biggest number so far in my 4 years ministry at Daisy Hill parish.

The front side or main door of our parish hall (OSCH) will undergo a face lift in the next few days. Rain water stagnates at the main door area of the hall thus it needs some top up concreting and installing drainage.

One might notice of the 2 statues of angels on both sides of the tabernacle in our chapel. There were donated by one of our parishioners and I thank her for her initiative, spiritual creativity and generosity.

One might also notice the colour of our church, which is pink. Every 4th Sunday in Lent is called *Laetare* Sunday. *Laetare* is a Latin word which means "Rejoice," and this call to rejoice is manifested in our Mass readings today especially the Gospel reading on the famous story of the prodigal son: the father rejoices because "his son was dead and has come to life, he was lost and is found." In the liturgical colour of the Church, PINK or Rose means REJOICE.

Looking ahead, our Palm Sunday masses, March 19 (Saturday) March 20 (Sunday) will kick off 10 minutes ahead of schedule, this is because of the palm blessing ceremony outside the Church and the procession with the congregation. Hence on March 19 Saturday the liturgy will start at 5:50pm. And for the 2 masses on Sunday March 20, it will start at 8:20am and 5:50pm. You may bring your own favourite palms, although the parish also provide palm leaves for you.

In solidarity with those who have been affected by the recent cyclone in Fiji, I have assigned some of our parishioners to collect monetary donations for the victims. This collection will take place right after the mass this weekend. We will immediately send our donations through Caritas Brisbane. And I would like to anticipate my sincere THANK YOU for your generosity and thoughtfulness for our brothers and sisters in Fiji.

TECHISM Basic questions answered according to the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

Let's get to know our faith.

Question: Why does God want there to be a Church?

God wills the Church because he wants to redeem us, not individually, but together. He wants to make all mankind his people.

No one gets to heaven by the asocial route. Someone who thinks only about himself and the salvation of his own soul is living a-socially. That is impossible both in heaven and on earth. God himself is not a-social; he is not a solitary, self-sufficient being. The Triune God in himself is "social", a communion, an eternal exchange of love. Patterned after God, man also is designed for relationship, exchange, sharing, and love. We are responsible for one another. (YOUCAT question 122)

Question: What is the task of the Church? // Why is the Church more than an institution?

What is the task of the Church?

The Church's task is to make the kingdom of God, which has already begun with Jesus, germinate and grow in all nations.

Wherever Jesus went, heaven touched earth: the kingdom of God was inaugurated, a kingdom of peace and justice. The Church serves this kingdom of God. She is not an end in herself. She must carry on what Jesus started. She should act as Jesus would act. She continues the sacred signs of Jesus (the sacraments). She hands on Jesus' words. That is why the Church, for all her weakness, is a formidable bit of heaven on earth.

Why is the Church more than an institution?

The Church is more than an institution because she is a mystery that is simultaneously human and divine.

True love does not blind a person but rather makes him see. With regard to the Church, this is precisely the case: Viewed from outside, the Church is only a historical institution with historical achievements, but also mistakes and even crimes - a Church of sinners. But that is not looking deep enough. After all, Christ became so involved with us sinners that he never abandons his Church, even if we were to betray him daily. This inseparable union of the human and the divine, this intertwining of sin and grace, is part of the

mystery of the Church. Seen with the eyes of faith, the Church is therefore indestructibly holy. (YOUCAT questions 123-124).

Question: What is unique about the People of God?

The founder of this people is God the Father. Its leader is Jesus Christ. Its source of strength is the Holy Spirit. The entryway to the People of God is Baptism. Its dignity is the freedom of the children of God. Its law is love. If this people remains faithful to God and seeks first the kingdom of God, it changes the world.

In the midst of all the peoples on earth, there is one people that is like no other. It is subject to no one but God alone. It is supposed to be like salt, which adds flavour; like yeast, which permeates everything; like light, which drives away the darkness. Anyone who belongs to the People of God must count on coming into conflict with people who deny God's existence and disregard his commandments. In the freedom of the children of God, however, we have nothing to fear, not even death. (YOUCAT question 125)

Question: How is the Church the Body of Christ?"/ And the Bride of Christ?"

What does it mean to say that the Church is the Body of Christ?

Above all through the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Eucharist, an inseparable union comes about between Jesus Christ and Christians. The union is so strong that it joins him and us like the head and members of a human body and makes us one.

What does it mean to say that the Church is the Bride of Christ?

Jesus Christ loves the Church as a bridegroom loves his bride. He binds himself to her forever and gives his life for her.

Anyone who has ever been in love has some idea of what love is. Jesus knows it and calls himself a bridegroom who lovingly and longingly courts his bride and desires to celebrate the feast of love with her. We are his Bride, the Church. In the Old Testament God's love for his people is compared to the love between husband and wife. If Jesus seeks the love of each one of us, how often is he then unhappily in love that is to say, with all those who want nothing to do with his love and do not reciprocate it?! (YOUCAT question 126-127)


